TOWNSHIP'S K-9 UNIT NOW ON THE JOB

Rex, a 13-month-old male German Shepherd from Holland, has finished an extensive four-week training program with Canine Officer Chad Miller at a special K-9 school and is now a member of the Township Police Department.

Rex was trained in patrol tactics, drug detection, and tracking at Castle's K-9 in Cumberland County. The new K-9 Unit was authorized by the Board of Supervisors because of a growing need in the Township, which has a population approaching 50,000.

The Township relied on other police agencies for K-9 assistance for the past three decades. It had a K-9 unit more than 30 years ago but discontinued it.

Supervisors had made the financing of the new unit a spending priority in the 2015 General Fund budget and said that residents who want to provide financial support for the unit can send contributions to the Township K-9 Unit, 425 Prince St., Harrisburg 17109.

Trash Container Option For Certain Households

As an alternative to the standard solid waste collection program, the Township offers a per container option for households that generate little waste.

A tag system is used by Waste Management, the Township's solid waste collector, to account for each container of solid waste. The tags are sold to residents at \$4 per container.

Residents may, on an annual basis, switch service types between the standard and the per container programs. **To do so, notify Waste Management during the first two weeks of July.**

The container option includes the weekly collection of unlimited recyclable materials, however, bulk item collection and leaf waste collection must be purchased separately from Waste Management.

Persons moving into the Township must select either the standard or per container program and notify Waste Management before the start of collection.

Arts/Parks 5K Run Set




The Township's 2nd Annual Arts & Parks 5K Run & Walk will be held on Saturday, July 18, starting with registration at 7 a.m., followed by the run at 8.

The event is for competitive runners who weave their way through two neighborhoods surrounding

Brightbill Park, behind the Friendship Center. Race day registration, which includes a shirt, is \$25. Children 10 and under can participate free.

Cash prizes will be awarded to the top three overall male and female finishers, as well as awards for the top three finishers in the following age divisions: youth (14 and under), teen (15-19), young adult (20-29), adult 1 (30-39), adult 2 (40-49), master (50-59), and senior (60 and over).

Proceeds from the event will be used to benefit the Arts Council, the Greenway Committee, and the Friendship Center.



Leaf Waste Collection Set Twice a Month

Waste Management, the Township's trash and recyclables collector, will collect unlimited leaf waste from regular service residential customers twice monthly through December 4. Tag-a-bag customers must buy tags for leaf waste collection. The tags are \$3.50 each.

Leaf waste collection day is the day following your standard trash/recyclables collection day. All leaf waste must be placed at the curb before 6 a.m. on collection day.

Leaf waste includes leaves, weeds, trimmings, bundled tree prunings and all garden waste. It **does not** include grass, which is collected as solid waste. Leaf waste must be placed loose in metal or plastic cans or "Kraft" bags, not exceeding 50 pounds when full. Plastic bags **may not** be used.

Brush must be cut and tied in bundles no more than six feet long, and tree branches can be no greater than two inches in diameter. Bundles cannot exceed 50 pounds. For more information, call Waste Management at 1-800-634-4595.

\$13 MILLION SEWER PROGRAM UNDERWAY IN TOWNSHIP

The Township's 2015 sewer replacement program began in January and will continue through this year and into the fall of 2016, at a total cost of \$13 million.

RIII Construction was awarded a \$5,391,811 contract to replace sewer lines for 290 properties east of North Mountain Road, between Blue Bird Avenue and Blue Grass Avenue. The project's completion date is December 2015.

A second major replacement project contract was awarded to M.F. Ronca, Inc., in the amount of \$7,617,740. The project will begin in July and includes 240 properties south of Jonestown Road and east of Nye's Road. The completion date is the fall of 2016.

For the safety of workers, Township officials are asking motorists to obey all traffic control devices and flagmen during lane closures.

Top Achievement Award Received by SCEMS

The American Heart Association has awarded its "Silver Achievement Award" to the South Central EMS for its treatment and transportation of STEMI patients.

The award is rare for an EMS that has participated in the Association program for only three years. The majority of EMS programs never receive the award. Out of 1,047 EMS agencies in Pennsylvania, South Central EMS is one of 62 being recognized and out of 38,000 in the U.S. only 447 have been recognized.

South Central EMS will be recognized on a national level by the American Heart Association in national publications, national and regional meetings, and on the AHA website.

Supervisors Approve Heroes Grove Contract

Township Supervisors have awarded a \$600,000 contract to ECI Construction for the beginning phase of the Dauphin County Heroes Grove project, which will be built in the Township's Brightbill Park, behind the Friendship Center.

When completed, Heroes Grove will feature an amphitheater and will also be a setting for educational seminars, festivals, concerts, and memorial services that will honor veterans, emergency responders, and law enforcement personnel.

The project was conceived by State Rep. Ronald S. Mar-sico and other public servants and civic and community leaders. The State Department of Conservation and Natural Resources approved a \$180,000 grant for the project.

Stormwater Management

Stormwater washes off of our roofs, yards, and driveways on its way to local waterways. To reduce water pollution:

- Use less fertilizer on lawns
- Recycle used motor oil
- Properly dispose Household Hazardous Wastes
- Pick up pet wastes
- Never dump pollutants in storm drains
- Wash vehicles at commercial car washes
- Drain pools & spas when no chlorine is present and, if possible, to a sanitary sewer

Be advised, Stormwater Management regulations require a Township permit prior to constructing impervious cover (buildings, driveways, swimming pools, decks, etc.) in excess of 1,000 sq. ft.

'Night Out for Safety' Will Be Held Aug. 4




The Township Police Department again this year will hold a “Night Out for Public Safety” from 5 to 8 p.m. on August 4 at George Park.

The annual event is designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness, gain support for local crime prevention efforts, produce stronger neighborhood spirit, strengthen community partnerships and send a message to criminals that the Township is organized and prepared to fight back.

The Police Department and other public safety services will hold demonstrations and explain the services they provide. There will also be events, games, and displays for children.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

The Board of Supervisors took the following action at recent meetings:

- ✓ Authorized the issuance of approximately \$14.5 million in General Obligation Bonds to refund 2009 Series C Bonds, saving the Township between \$1 million and \$1.5 million. The bonds were sold to finance sanitary sewer improvements.
- ✓ Approved the sale of nine used vehicles, an asphalt paver, a plow and a generator for a total price of \$54,485. There were multiple bidders for each item, with each item going to the highest bidder.
- ✓ Awarded a \$61,125 contract to Stoner’s Tree Service for the removal of 86 trees and the trimming of five others in a public right of way and the removal of 71 trees on private property in a sanitary sewer mini-basin. The trees are to be removed for the installation of sewer lines and laterals.
- ✓ Received a report from South Central Emergency Medical Services on 2014 operations in the Township. SCEMS responded to more than 5,000 calls, with the average arrival time at 6.62 minutes and an overall patient satisfactory rate of 97 percent. Calls increased by 560 over 2013.
- ✓ Approved a request from the Manada Conservancy to support its application for state funds to acquire 51 acres of land on Blue Mountain.
- ✓ Approved a three-year lease, at \$62,000 per year, for a 2015 Tymco street sweeper.
- ✓ Supported legislation in the State House and Senate that would authorize the use of radar by municipal police.
- ✓ Appointed David Berra to the Friendship Center Operating Board, with his term to expire at the end of 2016.

- ✓ Approved the leasing of 31 computers from HP Financial Services at a cost of \$20,655, to be paid over a four-year period.
- ✓ Awarded a \$6,000 contract to Dauphin Engineering for surveying service in a sanitary sewer mini-basin.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

- ✓ Approved a preliminary/final land development plan for Mid-Atlantic Machinery, which plans to construct a 3,625-square-foot addition to its facility at 6332 Flank Dr.

Compost Facility Open 3 Days a Week

The Township’s compost facility is open from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, for residents and contractors until December 12, weather permitting.

The 2015 annual fee for residents is \$40 and \$12 for a one-day permit. The annual permit fee for contractors is \$550, with a one-day permit costing \$60.

Anyone with a permit can drop off an unlimited amount of leaf waste and will be allowed to take screened compost and single grind woody waste from the facility, when available. Screened compost must be taken in Kraft bags or containers with capacities up to 36 gallons. It cannot be bulk loaded into trucks, trunks, or trailers.

Permits can be purchased at the Municipal Center and at Hornung’s Hardware, 6005 Blue Bird Ave. Permits are not sold at the compost facility. Vehicle registration information is required when applying for a permit.

The old African proverb “it takes a village to raise a child” is the key to getting well-rounded citizens who contribute to society. Another favorite saying is “you can build parks or jails – take your pick.”

As I look back on my childhood, certainly baseball, football, and other sports I played were influential in my development. I, like many parents and grandparents, worry about the amount of screen time our young impressionable minds are exposed to today. The statistics on overweight youngsters are scary, with our state ranking eighth in childhood obesity.

For these reasons, the Board of Supervisors considers our parks as an important part of raising our children in a positive manner. We enjoy more than 350 acres of parkland. We have 16 baseball fields, 9 softball fields, 9 soccer fields, 2 football fields, and a hockey rink, not to mention numerous basketball, tennis, and volleyball courts, playgrounds, and a dog park. This may

Facilities are just the start, however. Hundreds of volunteers coach youth sports teams, work on the playing fields, and run the programs. Holiday Trash Collection

Trash and recyclables will be collected a day late the weeks of May 25 and September 7 because of the Memorial Day and Labor Day holidays. Because July 4 is on a Saturday trash will be collected on the normal schedule on Friday, July 3.

Residents are asked to place all trash in containers or to secure it so that it doesn't blow onto adjoining properties or on public streets.
